









Sandford Ward – Activity room








Implementation Process

- After training in London we began trialling using the Creative Participation Form
- Looked at existing groups to ascertain which level of creative ability they were suitable for and developed new groups where we felt there were gaps in covering each level's aims
- □ Trialled 8 Task Assessments (TA)
- Determined our current patients level of creative ability using TA's, observation and therapeutic groups
- Promoted VdTMoCA on the ward using a notice board and leaflets before we formally presented to MDT
















Comments
