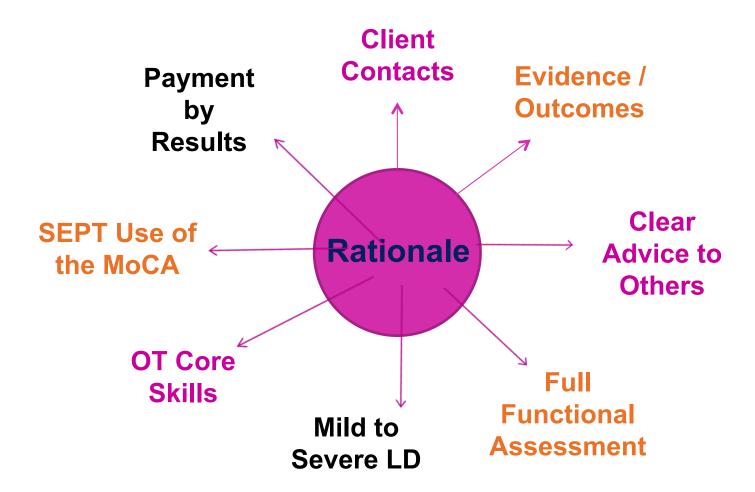


Overview of the Setting

- Community Team for Adults with a Learning Disability: Mild to Severe LD, complex physical needs, mental health and challenging behaviour.
- Definition of a learning disability a reduced understanding of new and complex information or impairment in social functioning (Goodman et al 2009)
- Locality: Southend-on-Sea and Castle Point
- Holistic Interventions: Functional assessment, skill development, posture management and equipment and environmental adaptation. 1:1 and Group Work.
- Referrals: Open system
- Staffing Levels: Varying bands and good skill mix



Rationale for Craft Group

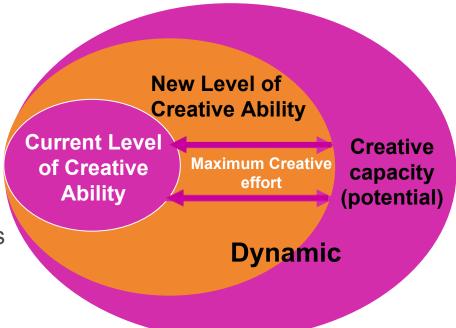




Model of Creative Ability

(Vona du Toit 1974 in Crouch & Alers, 2005)

- Adopted by SEPT
- Research (Samsonraj RS et al, 2012) promising in measuring improvement in functioning.
- Creative capacity / potential
- Motivation governs action
- Developmental / recovery model
- 4 Occupational performance Areas
- Sequential levels of functioning
- Activity based assessment / intervention
- Grading and handling principles for 'just right challenge'

WHAT IS IT?

A ten week group where people can try lots of different craft activities in a fun and friendly environment.

General aims of the craft group:~

- To provide a full functional assessment based on the Model of Creative Ability.
- This is a theoretical framework about an individuals functional ability. At the end of the group guidance and advice will be provided to assist those individuals supporting the person to ensure that activities they engage in are meaningful, appropriate and therapeutic. Where possible, we will attempt to sign post individuals on to suitable community based activities to promote inclusion.
- Each person can work towards individualised goals.



Attendance to the group can also assist to:~

- Promote self-esteem and self confidence in own abilities and social situations.
- Promote engagement in purposeful activity.
- To assist in relaxation.
- To promote appropriate social interaction skills.
- To provide opportunities to follow simple instructions to complete a finished product.
- To provide functional skill development opportunities.
- To provide opportunities to problem solve and make choices.
- For individuals to experience success.
- To have fun!



HOW TO ACCESS THIS GROUP?

The group is free to access.

Individuals may be referred to the Occupational Therapy Team by GP's, health or social care professionals, care agencies, families and individuals themselves.

Please contact us if you would like more information and/or a referral form. Following receipt of the referral, the OT team will screen it to decide whether the group will be appropriate and beneficial to the individual.





Craft Activity Group

- •10 weeks of up to 1 ½ hour sessions with tea break
- •Open to clients from Southend-on-Sea, Castle Point, Basildon and Brentwood
- Held at Community venue (central to all areas)
- •Relaxed / casual environment from clients point of view
- •6-10 clients of varying levels (self differentiation Passive participation)
- •Use of the VdT MoCA to grade activities and support for individual group members to provide 'just right challenge'.
- High staff to client ratio to accommodate varying levels / support needs

General Group Aims

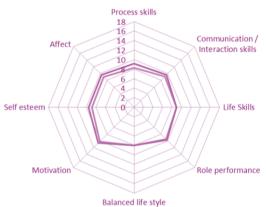
Creative activities hold therapeutic value for individuals by; increasing motivation, enhancing learning, increasing satisfaction and self-esteem, enabling self-expression and facilitating projection (Creek, 2002).

- ✓ Provide a thorough OT assessment of the client's level of function based on the VdT MoCA and provide clear recommendations / guidelines for supporting clients.
- ✓ Promote engagement in a purposeful activity within a community setting
- ✓ Promote self-esteem and self confidence in own abilities and social situations
- ✓ Promote appropriate social interaction skills
- ✓ Provide opportunities to experience success in completing a finished product
- √ To provide functional skill development opportunities
- √ To provide opportunities to problem solve and make choices
- ✓ To provide opportunities to experience occupational 'Flow' (Csikszentmihalyi,1992 in Goodman et al, 2009)
- √Assist in relaxation



Activity Participation Outcome Measure

- Tool developed by Dr Daleen Casteleijn (2012) as an outcome measure derived from the VdT MoCA.
- On-going research into the validity of the APOM.
 Previous studies indicate promising results
- Global assessment (8 domains)
- Provides a baseline and outcome

Grading a Canvas Bag Activity

	Self Differentiation	Passive Participation
Environment	 Position client at end of table with additional space Craft materials gathered and presented to client Only items required for step of task presented at any one time e.g. bag and peel off stickers 	 Table set up with easily available craft tools and materials Client sitting amongst other group members Client participates in choosing and gathering craft tools and materials Example of a decorated canvas bag provided
Activity	 Allows use of basic tools / materials – e.g. stickers, fabric pens Placement of stickers and mark making with fabric pen Regular rest periods throughout session 	 Use of tools (pen, paintbrush, scissors, needle and thread) Planning and decision making prior to decorating bag e.g. choice of materials and design Cutting out shapes, drawing designs, sewing buttons / ribbon.
Support	 Constant one to one support (hand on hand & verbal prompting) Describe tools, materials and actions as you go Simple clear command instructions. Offer limited visual choices of two decorations / colours 	 Regular supervision, encouragement and verbal prompting. Physical assistance given for unfamiliar and precision tasks e.g. precision cutting and threading needle Praise for effort and achievements Support to evaluate performance



Local Services, Local Solutions

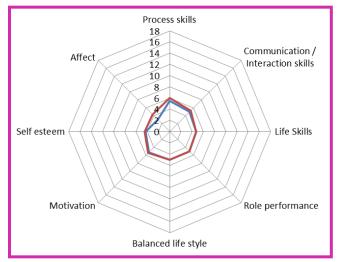
Outcomes of the Craft Group

- All clients showed a positive change in their creative ability / functioning during and following attendance to the craft group
- Mixed ability levels enabled clients to support one another and respect others individuality and difference
- Positive verbal and written feedback request for more groups
- Comprehensive reports and recommendations provided to support staff working with clients evidencing client's progress
- Out of 7 regular attendees to the most recent craft group, at least 2 clients are now regularly attending an independently run community craft group as signposted by OT
- Several attendees have attended subsequent assessment and skill development OT groups with positive effect
- Respond to service needs and increase face to face contacts
- Provide a more timely service for individuals with a variety of needs efficient service

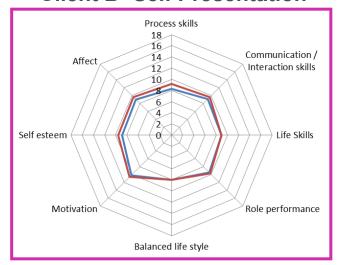


Outcomes of the Craft Group

Client A - Self Differentiation

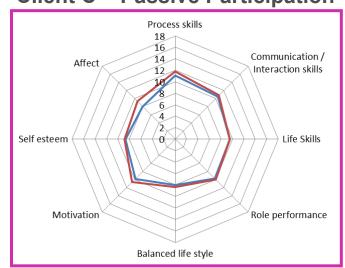


Client B- Self Presentation



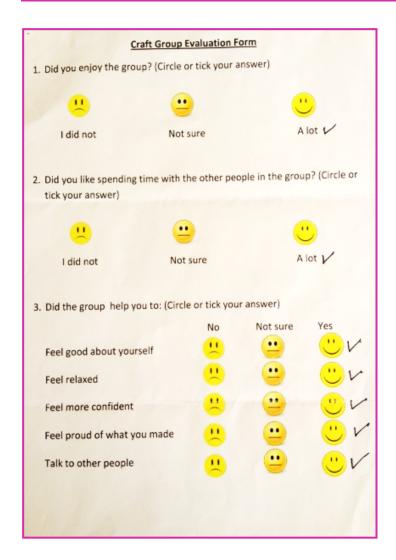
Client C – Passive Participation

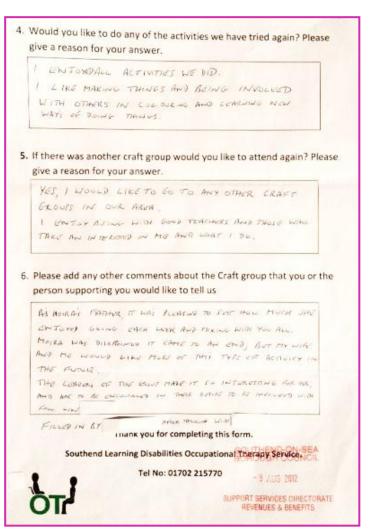






Outcomes of the Craft Group







Challenges

- Time consuming; paperwork, preparation and APOM / reports
- Descriptions can be ambiguous need to refer to literature (Crouch & Alers). Learning is ongoing
- Language of the APOM is mental health focused
- Scattered profile with some clients
- Staffing of group
- Community Venue
- Reliant on carers to follow recommendation





Future Plans

- Continuation of the craft group
- Paper work is being refined for ease of use and to support report writing
- APOM is being applied to other OT groups
- Consider assessment session prior to group (screen / paperwork)
- Review of use of baseline / outcome for individual clients
- Seeking more feedback about the groups and use of OT recommendations
- Instigated setting up a yearly group programme
- VdT MoCA and APOM is being used for one to one intervention
- Further staff training for VdT MoCA and APOM
- Meeting with OT staff from other bases to support the setting up of further craft groups in other areas
